ASV President Carole Nash will be our November speaker. I invite everyone to join us at Anthony's on the 8th at 6pm for dinner before her talk.

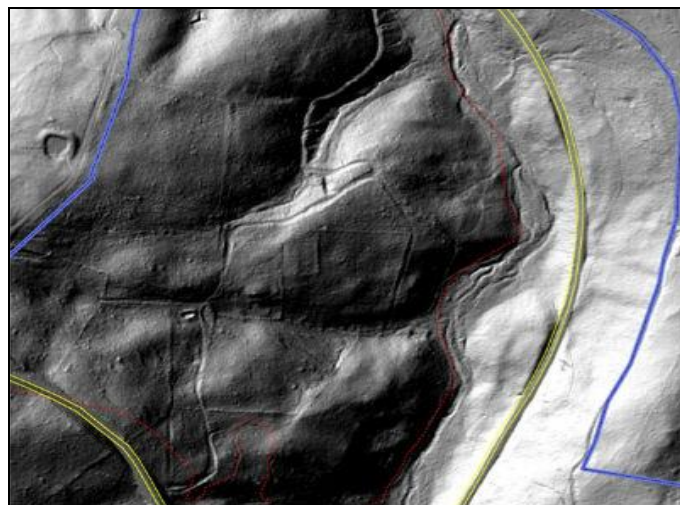

LOST BELMONT VINYARDS IN SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK

Over the past 40 years, the wine industry in Virginia has rapidly expanded from a small number of family-owned vineyards to more than 230 wineries. Shenandoah National Park holds the remains of one of the largest wineries in Virginia history that existed over 150 years ago: Belmont Vineyards. ISAT professor Dr. Carole Nash, assisted by a host of students, the park, and advanced geospatial technologies, have helped uncover the vibrant wine industry that existed in Virginia in the 19th and 20th centuries. Among teaching at James Madison University, Dr. Nash is the President of the ASV, heavily involved with the Masanutten Chapter, and the Blue Ridge Mountains.

NORTHERN VIRGINIA CHAPTER NOMINEE **FOR** **2017 VIRGINIA PROFESSIONAL** **ARCHAEOLOGIST OF THE YEAR WINS!**

It is with great pleasure that the Northern Virginia Chapter nominates Patrick O'Neill as the Archeological Society of Virginia (ASV) Professional Archaeologist of the Year for 2017. Mr. O'Neill has demonstrated outstanding performance and results in the pursuit of Virginia Archaeology over the last year capping many years

of equally outstanding performance as a **volunteer** in archaeological teaching, field work, laboratory, public advocacy, volunteer leadership and historic preservation in the communities of Northern Virginia.



While his important and long standing efforts at Kittiewan and the ASV alone should suffice as justification for this honor, I will briefly address the high points of his Northern Virginia academic and community service and recognition. It is important to note that Mr. O'Neill, is a practicing archaeologist with full time employment outside his professional. He chose this course to enable a full time family life, full time professional life and full time employment. Yes he is that busy.

Within the NVC chapter, Mr. O'Neill is one of only two members who have served as both Chapter and State Presidents. For several years, he has edited and published the Chapter's *Datum Point* newsletter which is distributed state wide as well as to Chapter members living outside Virginia. He routinely designs, organizes, and leads volunteer historic preservation field activities and laboratory sessions throughout Northern Virginia at the request of various historical organizations. These efforts introduce members of the community to archaeology in addition to providing local opportunities for Chapter members and certification students.

His work with for the Arlington Historical Society over the last year is particularly noteworthy. Mr. O'Neill leads an archaeological project with more than 100 volunteers at the oldest building in Arlington County, the Ball-Sellers House

(44AR0072). Their field work unearthed thousands of artifacts and is revitalizing community interest in the historic property. Moreover, this work has aided in preserving the original structure's 270-year-old foundation. He continues to lead the volunteer effort to clean and process the artifacts for continued study and exhibit. O'Neill's work, alongside Arlington Historical Society's site directory (Annette Benbow), resulted in over 2000 logged volunteer hours and counting as the laboratory and curation work continues in the Hume School.

In parallel, he led a successful community effort in Arlington County to save and preserve an historic cemetery endangered by development by conducting in-depth research on the site and its historical significance, tracing the ownership, and presenting his evidence at government hearings and in public forums including the creation of an on-line petition that garnered 1100 signatures. For his efforts, the Arlington County Historical Society presented him with an award for exceptional volunteerism (captured in the *Datum Point*).

Mr. O'Neill has published at least four articles in the *ASV Quarterly Bulletin* (2008, 2009, 2012, 2014) as well as numerous articles in the *NVC Datum Point*. His book **“To Annoy or Destroy the Enemy: The Battle of the White House after the Burning of Washington”** provided a well-researched account of a little-known precursor battle that he hypothesizes provided the basis for American forces' success at Ft. McHenry. His efforts resulted in the Ross Netherton Award from the Fairfax County Historical Commission in 2014.

This year, Mr. O'Neill designed and taught an undergraduate course in historical preservation (archaeological and architectural) field work and techniques at the Northern Virginia Community College Loudon. In typical O'Neill efficiency, this course provided hands-on experience to the students while advancing research on the oldest school house in Arlington County, the Hume School.

As Dr. Mike Johnson told me during our discussion of Patrick's accomplishments in preparation for this nomination, “Patrick does the right things for the right reasons.” In my opinion, that is the highest compliment a professional can give another professional. In light of his numerous unselfish

achievements in the research and preservation at Kittiewan and meaningful successes in Northern Virginia, our chapter is proud to nominate Mr. Patrick O'Neill for the ASV Professional Archaeologist of the Year.
